### Eyes Wide Shut

Monday, April 7, 7:30 p.m.

In *Eyes Wide Shut*, Director Stanley Kubrick indulges in a series of increasingly dangerous, yet never consummated erotic adventures and sexual yearnings. His source is *Traumnovelle*, a 1926 phantasmagoric novella by Vienna's Arthur Schnitzler. His medium is Tom Cruise, a young, rich, and handsome doctor whose jealousy of his wife's (truly breathtaking Nicole Kidman) sexual fantasies about another man plunges him into the erotic delirium that reflects his urges and inhibitions, his desire for sexual revenge as well as transgression, his guilt, doubts, and fears. The setting has been moved from 1920's Vienna to contemporary New York. Roger Ebert calls *Eyes Wide Shut* an "erotic daydream," the ever-extended foreplay, where each encounter is an elaborate set piece of sexual possibility.
