



Housing Contracts for 2004-05 School Year

Did you go though Room Selection and pick a room?

If so, look for your housing contract in your campus Landrum Box after February 25. In order to confirm your housing assignment for the 2004- 2005 school year, you will need to sign your contract and return it to the Department of University Housing in Watson Hall by the deadline, March 11 at 5 p.m. *If you do not sign and return your contract by that date, your housing assignment will be cancelled and, should you decide to seek housing on campus at a later date, you will have to apply for housing through the regular application process.*

If you would like to possibly change your housing assignment for the 2004- 2005 school year, we will be offering Room Assignment Change on Wednesday, March 24 in Watson Hall. Room assignment changes will be first come, first served. Look for times in future editions of TWIRL. To be eligible for room assignment change, you will need to have signed up for a room through the Room Selection process and signed your housing contract for the 2004-2005 school year.



If you want to cancel your housing assignment, you will need to write CANCEL on your housing contract and return it to the Department of University Housing. Please note that if you do cancel your housing assignment by the deadline on the contract, you will be charged a \$100 cancellation fee and be refunded \$200 of the \$300 security deposit. Should you cancel the assignment after you have signed the contract, there will be further financial obligations on your part depending on when you cancel and what type of contract you are canceling.

Did you miss Room Selection and want to live on campus for the 2004- 2005 school year?

We will be offering a last chance room selection for all current Georgia Southern students (on or off campus students are eligible) on Thursday, March 25 from 2-4 p.m. in the Watson Lobby.

If you want to participate in the last chance room selection, please be sure to complete a housing application at www.gsuhousing.com (click on "Apply"), pay your \$300 security deposit if it isn't already on file and then show up on March 25. This will be a first come, first served process.
