

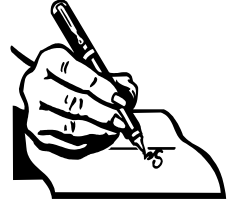


Housing Assignment Changes

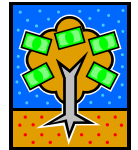

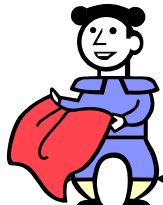

Spotlight on . . . Dr. Trent Maurer

Dr. Trent Maurer is an assistant professor of Child & Family Development, and he teaches Family Development, Lifespan Development, Research Methods, Prenatal & Infant Development, and Child Development. Dr. Maurer also conducts research on what gets fathers involved with providing physical care for their pre-school aged children. Dr. Maurer holds a *Summa Cum Laude* B.A. in Psychology and History from the University of Notre Dame, and he received his M.S. and Ph.D. in Human Development & Family Studies from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. This is Dr. Maurer's first year at Georgia Southern, and he says that he enjoys it here because of the opportunity he has "to teach so many interesting classes to so many interested students who really want to make a difference in the lives of children and families." When asked what inspired him to pursue a career in Child & Family Development, Dr. Maurer replies, "There aren't enough men in the field, which contributes to the false belief that men are not interested in, or skilled at dealing with, children and families. I [also] love being able to teach college students about relationships, families, and children—teaching is something I love and am really passionate about . . . plus I get to play with the babies in our lab school! What could be more enjoyable?"

In his spare time, Dr. Maurer enjoys gourmet cooking, gardening, ballroom dance, and yoga. His advice to students is to "stop cutting class! It is not only disrespectful; it directly affects what you learn. Getting notes from a classmate is NOT the same as being in class." He goes on to say that students should be sure to read the material for class, to study for tests, and to read the syllabus and assignment directions carefully because students have the ability to be successful, and if they fail to succeed, "they have nobody to blame but themselves."

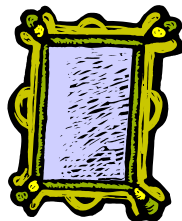
