Approximately 102,000 chemists currently work in the United States. The majority of these chemists are employed in the manufacturing firms – mostly in the chemical manufacturing industry which includes the production of plastics and synthetic materials, drugs, soaps and cleansers, paints, industrial organic chemicals, and other miscellaneous chemical products. Possible occupational opportunities include, but are not limited to, chemical technician, forensic chemist, pharmaceutical sales representative, soil scientist, and toxicologist. Ms. Brenda Aytes is Manager of Printing Services in the Eagle Print Shop. (The Eagle Print Shop does everything a “quick copy” shop does. They print posters, organizational programs, booklets, class projects, transparencies, portfolios, résumés, and any other item needed for classes. The Eagle Print Shop also offers practicum positions to Printing Management students to aid their educational process.) Ms. Aytes has been at Georgia Southern since January 1990. She was originally hired to run the retail store in the Russell Union, which opened the summer of 1990. Ms. Aytes says that she has “been in the retail arena since 1973, with printing being in the background of almost every company I worked for. It is a very creative business, and I enjoy the creative process.” Ms. Aytes is currently attending Georgia Southern to achieve a BBA in Information Systems.
