



Robert F. Kennedy, Jr. on Campus Wednesday

Robert F. Kennedy Jr., a noted attorney who is one of the nation's most respected advocates for the environment, will address a number of important environmental issues and his most recent book on Wednesday, April 14, at 7 p.m. in the Nessmith-Lane Building. A reception and book signing will follow the lecture.

A graduate of Harvard University who earned his law degree at the University of Virginia, Kennedy serves as chief prosecuting attorney for the Hudson Riverkeeper, senior attorney for the Natural Resources Defense Council and president of the Waterkeeper Alliance.

Kennedy was credited with leading the fight to protect New York City's water supply. The New York City watershed agreement, which he negotiated on behalf of environmentalists and the city's watershed consumers, is considered an international model in stakeholder consensus negotiations and sustainable development.

Spotlight on . . . Mr. Jim Harbour

Mr. Jim Harbour is the Director of Theatre in the Department of Communication Arts. He teaches Theatre Appreciation, Fundamentals of Action, Play Directing, and all upper division acting classes. Along with teaching, Mr. Harbour also directs and occasionally acts in plays in the main stage season of the Theatre & Performance program. Mr. Harbour has been on Georgia Southern's faculty for eight years, and when asked what inspired to him to teach theatre and acting courses, he says, "After a disastrous freshman year, I had a wonderful aunt who was a college professor (math) who told me to take a class that seemed fun—not in my major (history), not a requirement, just something that seemed like fun." Mr. Harbour was glad he did this because "I took a class in Speech and Drama and fell in love with performing. Every time I work on a play by a great playwright such as Shakespeare, I feel like I am inhabiting the world of a genius. I feel smarter—wiser—when I am in their world, and it is a very heady feeling."

Mr. Harbour is married to a first grade teacher whom he says is "perhaps the funniest person you will ever meet." He is also a self-proclaimed sports nut. Football is his favorite sport, but he says that he is a "die-hard Cubs fan that [traces] back to a couple of years [when he] lived in Chicago in the '80's." Mr. Harbour says that "the key to success in school is to find a way to get interested in the subject matter of each of your classes. Find something about the class that you can develop a sense of wonder about. If you approach a class with a sense of discovery, then you will assuredly do well."
