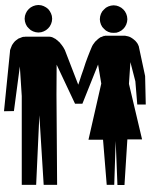




Sex in the Ballroom



Sex Signals: Without being preachy or threatening, the 75-minute show blends improvisational comedy, humor, and audience participation to tackle the difficult issues of dating, sex, and date rape on college campuses. The show explores how mixed messages, gender role stereotypes, and unrealistic fantasies contribute to misunderstanding between the sexes. At their worst, these factors enable some to view date rape as a simple seduction, and for victims of date rape to blame themselves for their vulnerability. Although the message is a serious one, the show uses humor throughout to engage audiences in candid discussions about interpersonal relationships. Seasoned educators and facilitators, the performers strike a balance between laughing about the differences between men and women, and clearly communicating some serious messages about how we treat one another.

Don't Let the Cold and Flu Season "Bug" You

The Common Cold: Starts slowly, most symptoms are localized in the head. Symptoms include the following:

Sneezing	Runny Nose
Stuffy Head	Headache
Sore Throat	Cough
Hoarseness	Fever below 101° F



A cold can last 7-10 days.

The Flu: Starts abruptly with "generalized" symptoms. Symptoms include:

Fever over 101° F	Weakness
Aches and pains	Dry cough
Headache	Sore eyes
Runny nose	Sore throat
Sneezing	

Symptoms begin to subside after 1-2 days, complete recovery may take a week or more.

Tips to feel better:

- Drink plenty of fluids.
- Get plenty of rest.
- Seek medical help from Health Services.

"Attorney for the Damned" on Stage

On Tuesday, September 30, a staging of *Clarence Darrow*, a one-act play by David Rintels, will be performed in the Nessmith-Lane Building Auditorium at 8 p.m. The play stars Dr. David Addington as Darrow. Admission is free.

Clarence Darrow is considered by many to be one of the best trial lawyers of the 20th century. He is best known for the Scopes trial of 1925, and the movie *Inherit the Wind* is based on his life as a prosecutor in the trial. Because Darrow was so renowned as a criminal defense lawyer, Irving Stone, his biographer, referred to him as "Attorney for the Damned."

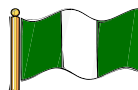
