



Eagle Expo/Education Career Fair

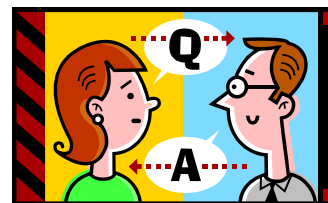

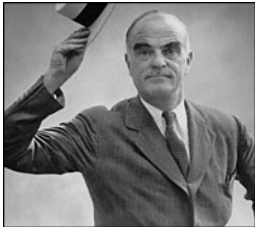
