



3 Doors Down to perform at Paulson April 27

Georgia Southern will present a major outdoor spring concert featuring the top rock group 3 Doors Down at Paulson Stadium on Wednesday, April 27. An exceptional live band, 3 Doors Down stands among the top concert draws in North America and has sold 12 million albums since its debut in 2000. Their album, "Seventeen Days," debuted at No. 1 on Billboard Magazine's top 200 albums chart Feb. 26. 3 Doors Down has had six No.1 singles—"Kryptonite," "Duck & Run," "Loser," "Be Like That," "When I'm Gone" and "Here Without You"—making the group one of the most popular and consistently successful rock bands in recent history. On the evening of the concert, the stadium will open at 6 p.m. and the show will begin at 7 p.m. Two bands, breaking benjamin and Silvertide, will open for 3 Doors Down.



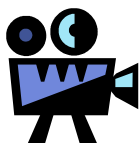
Tickets for the concert are \$20 for Georgia Southern students (a limit of four tickets per ID). All seating is general admission. Tickets are one sale on campus at the athletics ticket office in the Cowart Building on Lanier Drive near the stadium, and at the Union. The Cowart Building ticket office is open Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and accepts cash, MasterCard or Visa. The Union location is open Monday through Thursday from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and accepts cash only. Daylight Saving Time

Daylight Saving Time begins for most of the United States at 2 a.m. on the first Sunday of April—that's today! Remember to "spring forward" one hour today.



Daylight Saving Time has been used in the United States and in Europe since the First World War. To conserve fuel needed to produce electric power, Germany and Austria began saving daylight in 1916, and other countries quickly followed. The plan was adopted in the United States during parts of 1918 and 1919, but was repealed in 1919 over President Wilson's veto (the time change was unpopular, in part because people got up and went to bed earlier than—although we speak of a longer day, DST just shifts the daylight one hour ahead; in a more rural economy, early morning daylight was appreciated).

During World War II, the United States instituted year-round Daylight Saving Time, which was called "War Time." From 1945 to 1966, there was no federal law about Daylight Saving Time, although local areas observed Daylight Saving Time. As the broadcasting and transportation industries increasingly began to nationalize American life, the lack of a national standard created significant problems. On April 12, 1966, President Lyndon Johnson signed the Uniform Time Act into law. The federal law was amended in 1986 and began Daylight Saving Time at 2 a.m. on the first Sunday of April and ends at 2 a.m. on the last Sunday of October.

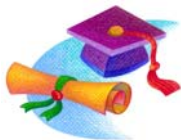


Career Corner: Dressing for Success
