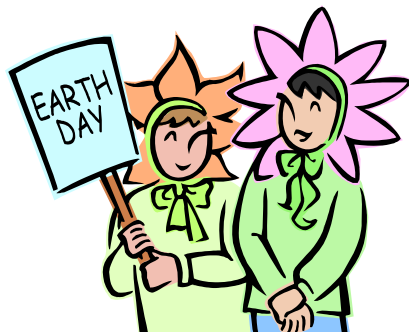




GSU Earth Day!

Keep Bulloch Beautiful will be hosting an electronics recycling event on Saturday, April 23 at the Statesboro Mall. The event will be from 8 a.m.-10 a.m. Below is a list of what will be collected.

All Electronics Containing Circuit Cards, computers, printers, monitors, laptops, servers, keyboards, mice, docking stations, external hard drives, tape drives, external modems, electric motors, transformers, sound equipment (such as receivers, amplifier, CD/DVD player, etc.), computer network equipment (such as network cards, hubs, routers, etc.), test equipment (oscilloscope, voltmeter, amp meter, power meter, voltage generators, etc.), telecommunication equipment (cell phones, telephones, network switches, antennas etc.), wires and cables, all types of circuit cards, AC adapters, power supplies, surge protectors, switch boxes, calculators, network/telecom racks/cabinets, fax machines, scanners, overhead projectors, VCRs, tape players, cash registers, office shredders, and copy machines.



We are waiving the recycling fee for all e-scrap material listed above for Georgia Recycling events with the exception of TVs. There will be a \$5 charge for recycling TVs.

Kosashvili has something more radical to spring on us. Unmarried at 31, Zaza is a blot on his extended Georgian-Israeli family, who parade one after another prospective bride before him. Eventually it is discovered that the reason for Zaza's reluctance is his secret relationship with a divorced woman. His family resolves upon a preemptive strike. The desperate measure it takes illustrates the problems with the repressive social process by which young men have to be brutally tamed before they can take their place in perpetuating the patriarchal order.
