



Common Questions about Room Selection for Fall 2006

- *What is Room Selection?* Room selection is the process by which current residence hall students choose a room for the 2006-2007 academic year.
- *Who is eligible to participate in Room Selection?* All students who currently reside in University Housing are eligible. There will NOT be a lottery as was the case in previous years. **All students who desire a room will be guaranteed a room somewhere in campus housing provided they meet the posted deadlines.**
- *How does the process actually work?* Within the next several days you will be receiving a brochure in your campus P.O. box that explains how you actually go through the room selection process, how to pick your roommates, what buildings are open for you to live in next year and other important information.
- *What types of housing other than traditional "residence halls" are available on campus? Why should I consider living on campus when I can get an apartment off campus?* Upper-class housing options include suites and apartments. For the 2006- 2007 school year only upper-class students will be eligible to live in Southern Pines (suite style with private bedrooms), Southern Courtyard (which will be 9 mo. Housing starting Fall '06), Watson Commons (suite style with shared bedrooms), Sanford (apartments with shared bedrooms), and Kennedy (suite and apartment style shared bedrooms). Kennedy Hall and Southern Pines will have some first-year students who are athletes.

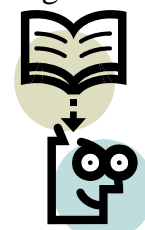

Spotlight On . . . Ms. Rachel Van Horn

Ms. Rachel Van Horn is an instructor in the Department of Writing and Linguistics at Georgia Southern University. Rachel obtained her undergraduate degree in 1999, followed by her Master's Degree in 2001, both in English Literature at Georgia Southern. During her academic career, she published poems and short stories in the *Miscellany* and was in Sigma Tau Delta, the English honor society. In addition, she was a member of Sigma Delta Pi, the Spanish honor society (Spanish was her minor). Additionally, she sang in University Singers for two years. She attended the Literary Britain trip to the United Kingdom in graduate school.

In 2002, Ms. Van Horn came to Georgia Southern University as an instructor. She teaches composition and writing, and has taught Regents essay classes. This past summer, she taught for the Eagle Incentive Program at Georgia Southern to help academically at-risk Freshmen. Also in the summer, she was selected to participate in the Georgia Southern Writing Project, a renowned program that helps teachers work on their writing and connect their students to writing on more meaningful levels. She is interested in the creative process and the connection between writing and spiritual well-being. In the last year, Rachel has presented on the psychological benefits of journal writing in the classroom at two conferences. This semester, she is teaching an 1101 class with a Medicine and Ethics component.

In her free time, Rachel enjoys the outdoors, working out, walking, swimming, reading, writing, movies, singing, meditation, and of course, teaching. She has two cats, Othello and Precious. Her fiancé, Philip, is a manager at Chic-fil-A.
