Pest Control



The initial step to the elimination of insects in your resident hall is sanitation. All insects need food, moisture and harborage in order to survive. The pest control operator's success at an individual's residence will be determined by the residence housekeeping.

The two most troublesome insects found in residence halls and apartments are ants and roaches. Both of which can be completely eliminated, but not with pesticides alone. The outcome solely resides on the sanitation of the individual residence; below are some steps each of our students can practice in order to be insect free:

1. Wash dirty dishes immediately after eating. Do not leave dirty dishes on table, counter or place in the sink. After washing dishes, drain sink, do not leave water standing.
2. Vacuum on a regular basis. (Not just before your family visits.)
3. Do not leave chips, cookies, cereal, etc. that have interior bags left open. Either seal with an appropriate sized zip lock bag, or place in the refrigerator.
4. After consuming beverages rinse containers and dispose of in an appropriate manner.
5. When cleaning residence hall/apartment, do not place trash bag outside the door until leaving the premises. Place in dumpster immediately.

Daylight Saving Time



Daylight Saving Time begins for most of the United States at 2 a.m. on the first Sunday of April—that's today! Remember to "spring forward" one hour today.

Daylight Saving Time has been used in the United States and in Europe since the First World War. To conserve fuel needed to produce electric power, Germany and Austria began saving daylight in 1916, and other countries quickly followed. The plan was adopted in the United States during parts of 1918 and 1919, but was repealed in 1919 over President Wilson's veto (the time change was unpopular, in part because people got up and went to bed earlier then—although we speak of a longer day, DST just shifts the daylight one hour ahead; in a more rural economy, early morning daylight was appreciated).

During World War II, the United States instituted year-round Daylight Saving Time, which was called "War Time." From 1945 to 1966, there was no federal law about Daylight Saving Time, although local areas observed Daylight Saving Time. As the broadcasting and transportation industries increasingly began to nationalize American life, the lack of a national standard created significant problems. On April 12, 1966, President Lyndon Johnson signed the Uniform Time Act into law. The federal law was amended in 1986 and began Daylight Saving Time at 2 a.m. on the first Sunday of
