



APPLY NOW TO BE A PEER TUTOR FOR SPRING 2007

Are you a good student? Interested in enhancing your communication skills? Like to help others? How about applying to be a Peer Tutor for the Spring 2007 Semester? Peer Tutors are student staff members whose focus is the academic success of residents. Working in conjunction with the Academic Mentor staff, Peer Tutors provide specific topic tutoring in the halls. They tutor students, both individually and in groups, in one or more subject areas (usually math, science, and English). The Peer Tutor position is *not* live-in. The position averages 10-15 hours a week during the academic semester, and the time commitment is concentrated during weekday evenings. Peer Tutors must be currently enrolled in 12 or more credit hours and have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0. Salary for the position is \$7.40/hour paid in bi-weekly installments throughout the academic year.

Career Corner: Ten Interviewing Rules

In the current job market, you'd better have your act together, or you won't stand a chance against the competition. Check yourself on these 10 basic points before you go on that all-important interview.

1. Look Sharp.
2. Be on Time.
3. Do Your Research.
4. Be Prepared.
5. Show Enthusiasm.
6. Listen.
7. Answer the Question Asked.
8. Give Specific Examples.
9. Ask Questions.
10. Follow Up.

How to Stop Internet Pop-Ups

There are hundreds of software programs designed to stop, block, and/or prevent pop-up, pop-under, and other types of intrusive and annoying Internet advertising. Here are some of the more popular and widely used programs we would recommend trying.

Microsoft Internet Explorer 6.0

Microsoft has included a popup blocker in the Internet Explorer 6.0 browser, which should be enabled by default. To change the settings or verify whether it is enabled you can follow these steps:

1. Open Internet Explorer
2. Click **Tools**
3. Click **Options**
4. Click the **Privacy** tab
5. Find the Pop-up Blocker section at the bottom of the Privacy tab and check the "Block pop-ups" option. You also can disable the sound or the information bar displayed when a pop-up is blocked by clicking the **Settings** button.

Google Toolbar

If you are using Microsoft Windows and Internet Explorer, it is highly recommended that you try the Google Toolbar, which includes a free popup blocker.

Mozilla Firefox

Before Microsoft released MSIE 6.0, many users switched to Firefox because it included its own pop-up blocker. If you're running Mozilla Firefox and want to change how it handles pop-ups follow these steps:

1. Open Mozilla Firefox
2. Click **Tools**
3. Click **Options**
4. Click the **Web features** button on the left side of the Options window. By default this feature should be enabled; if you wish to disable it, uncheck "Block Popup Windows." To block pop-ups on a site you had previously allowed them, click "Allowed sites."

To disable pop-ups from any browser plug-ins, follow these steps:

1. Open Mozilla Firefox
2. In the URL field type "about:config" and press enter
3. This should open the Firefox config window
4. Right-click on a black portion of the window; click "New" then "Integer"
5. For the preference name type "privacy.popups.disable_from_plugins" and click Ok. For the value type "2".
6. We also suggest you locate the "privacy.popups.firstTime" option in the about:config screen and change the value of this setting to "false."
