Be smart about keeping yourself and your possessions safe. Crime can, and does, happen on all college campuses, including Georgia Southern.

1. Always lock your door when you leave.
2. Do not loan your keys to anyone including friends and roommates. They may not be as careful with them as you are.
3. Do not prop exterior doors to your hall.
4. Do not let people you do not know into your hall.
5. Report suspicious behavior to your RA or the police by dialing 681-5234.
6. Do not walk alone at night; call 681-5234 for an escort.
7. Report suspicious behavior to your RA or the police.
8. Keep small valuable items (credit cards, phone cards, lap tops) out of sight and in a locked drawer or closet.
9. Do not leave books, coats or other valuable items unattended anywhere on campus.
10. Do not bring irreplaceable property and heirlooms to campus.
11. Mark your personal property with an identifying number.

Life After College...Hard to imagine now, but it will soon happen! You need to begin thinking about things that you will need to do. Did you know that:

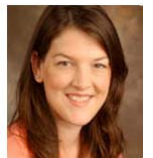


1. You should find a mentor at your new job.

Upholding the Human Rights of Women &
Immigrants**



Dabney Evans is Executive Director of the Emory University Institute of Human Rights and lecturer in the [Hubert Department of Global Health](#) at the [Rollins School of Public Health](#) at Emory University.

Evans was a co-principal investigator for the "Tibet Trauma Study" which examined trauma, mental health and perceptions of human rights among adolescent Tibetan refugees. Her research focus on the nondiscriminatory provision of the right to health includes work with:
