



## ARTFEST 2008

For 26 years, Georgia Southern University has hosted an annual spring celebration of the arts and art education on Sweetheart Circle. This year's [ArtsFest '08](#) is planned for Saturday, April 5, from noon to 5 p.m., and it is free of charge and open to the public.

Last year's event brought more than 6,000 visitors to campus.

The day's plans include the traditional Art Stops, an Artists' Market, music, and performances by the Curious Moon Puppets. Irish folksinger Harry O'Donoghue will perform at 2 and 4 p.m., and from noon to 2 p.m., three hand-picked bands will compete in "Battle of the Bands."



More than a dozen vendors have registered for the Artists' Market, including Bill Stephens, known as "The Wood Man," and photographer Wendy Chambers. Student groups including Club Mud, the Jewelry Guild, the Paper Society, and MFA students will display and sell their work. Olivia Carter will offer "Bead for Life," colorful single and multi-strand necklaces, bracelets, earrings, bags, and notecards for sale. The beads, created from rolled paper, are made by Ugandan women as a way of providing food, shelter, and medical care for their families. All proceeds from the "Bead for Life" sale will be returned to the artists.

Art Stops will include an opportunity for visitors to "Paint a Pet" for the Humane Society, make cards to support our troops, use clay, paint, and create jewelry using "Bead for Life" beads.

**Johnson Hall**

Johnson Hall was built in 1971 and named to honor Sophia Johnson, Dean of Women. Johnson Hall was originally built to house freshman women at Georgia Southern College. In 1998 Johnson hall became a co-ed residence hall and home to the Success-In-U program - Georgia Southern's first Living Learning Community. Men and women have lived in this residence hall for the past 10 years. Over 400 students lived in Johnson each year.



**Olliff Hall**

Olliff Hall was built in 1966 and dedicated on October 30th by Governor Sanders. Olliff was named to honor the late Charles P. Olliff, Sr., one of Statesboro's outstanding business leaders. The cost to build Olliff hall was \$949,843.00. Originally Olliff Hall was built to house Junior and Senior women at Georgia Southern College. Over 300 students lived in Olliff Hall each year.



**Winburn Hall**

Winburn Hall was built in 1966 and dedicated on October 30th by Governor Sanders. Named to honor R.L. (Mr. Bob) Winburn, the comptroller of Georgia Southern College from 1931 till he retired on July 1, 1951, Winburn Hall cost \$810,717.00 to construct. Winburn Hall was originally designed to house sophomore women at GSC. Over 250 students lived in Winburn Hall each year.

## Wellness Made Easy

- \* Keep washing your hands. It reduces the risk of colds and the flu. If you do so at least five times a day, you cut the rate of respiratory illness by up to 45 percent.
- \* Light beers do not mean "light" in alcohol. They usually contain as much alcohol as regular beer. They are light in calories however, which is reduced by about 25 percent.
- \* Choose high fiber whole grain breads. These breads make you feel fuller. People who eat them tend to consume fewer calories during the rest of the day.
- \* Don't take any supplements (or tea) containing the herb comfrey. It supplies substances that can harm the liver and may be carcinogenic.
- \* If you're prone to nosebleeds, apply petroleum jelly just inside the nostrils once or twice daily to moisturize them.
- \* Eat more pears and apples. These and certain other fruits may reduce the risk of lung disease, such as chronic bronchitis and emphysema.

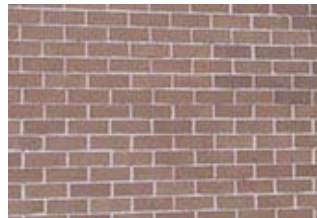
- \* Antiperspirants do not cause breast cancer.

This May, Johnson, Winburn, and Olliff Hall will be knocked down. Bricks from the three residence halls slated for demolition this summer are on sale, each featuring a plate with lettering with the Georgia Southern logo. "We will start mailing bricks out in June and we'll probably go through October or November," said Director of University Housing Vickie Hawkins. "In addition to having a keepsake, their purchase will help us provide training and development activities for staff and additional furniture and equipment for Centennial Place," said Hawkins. Centennial Place will be a new 1,000 bed residence hall constructed on the site of Johnson, Olliff and Winburn. This new hall will open in August 2009.



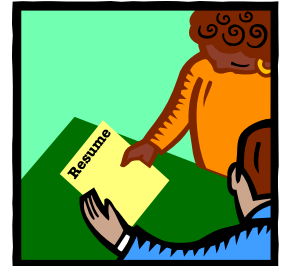
Current students living in those buildings can buy one for \$25.
